If Mr George Scott has received his papers (those belonging to his office as ~~Territorial~~ Auditor) containing my bill for printing the Laws, you will oblige me by examining my bills, and if it meets your approbation, please draw and order on the Auditor for the balance due \$86.<sup>89</sup>/<sub>100</sub>, and deliver the same to Doctor C. Baker, the bearer of this. I presume there can now be no further difficulty in accepting my account, as my proposals for publishing the Laws can be referred to, which will put all the objections to rest. I wish Mr Crillenden to satisfy himself of the correctness of my charges, and therefore wish him to examine my proposals.

Enclosed I send you a bill against the Territory for \$5, being for the publication of the acting Governor's proclamation relative to the election of Delegates to Congress. - Mr Crillenden when here a few days ago, told me it must be presented to you for acceptance. - If it meets your approbation, you will please certify it to the Auditor, and deliver to Dr Baker.
