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Dr. Crenshaw Says World War Useless

If the United States was a treaty keeping nation and the other nations which signed the Nine-power Pact had kept the treaty to the letter, the present World War would not be in progress, according to Dr. C. Crenshaw.

Speaking at the Rotary Club Tuesday, Dr. Crenshaw said, "When Japan began to take her first bites out of China and when Italy took Etheopia, we and the other signers of the treaty sent notes of protest.

"Some of them including England didn't even do this. Had we all stuck by our contract, war would have been avoided."

Dr. Crenshaw discussed his experience while a missionary in China and told the Rotarians that \$7 in American money will set a man up in business and provide a living for him and his family.

"One out of every thousand people in China are Christians. In spite of this, those in control of China are fundamentally Christians and it is thought that they will eventually win the war.

"Japan is ruled by an Emperor or God. These people cannot and do not have the desire to live lives which will endure.

"They do not have a religion based on the three words used for peace in China which mean peace under shelter, economic peace or security and peace among men or men whose hearts are on an equal basis."

Dr. Crenshaw and his wife and daughter left yesterday for Ninety-Six, S. C., after visiting in the S. Burleigh home. Dr. Crenshaw is minister in a Presbyterian church in Ninety-Six.
