colored, yellow, brown, grey or almost black. While warts may occur on any part of the skin, they are most common on the hands, feet, knees, scalp, face and neck. They are also found on cattle, dogs and rabbits. They most commonly appear in the age group of 16 to 20 but may develop at any age. Usually warts disappear, even without treatment, within one to three years. Some may last for many years. For centuries may folklore remedies have been known, most of which are as harmless as they are useless. They are a minor malady, often resulting in embarrassment to the individual but not harmful to the general health.

Rohwer Japanese Fatally Injured

Rohwer Center lost its first citizen working in behalf of the community on January 19, when Seizo Imada, 60, block worker of 19-2-C was caught under a falling tree while working in the woods in back of the hospital.

The falling tree caught him on the hip and pinned him to the ground.

Shortly after being taken to the hospital he died of shock resulting from his injuries which included a possible fracture of

the right hip and spine, a crushing injury to the left chest and possible internal injuries.
