GENERAL COMMENT BY PROJECT DIRECTOR: (Discuss briefly the major problems and developments at the project this week).

One of the major problems of the evacuees in the center is the need for some of their personal effects from the West Coast which are now stored in government and private warehouses. Many of the items are now needed and may be critically needed within the very near future, principally winter wearing apparel and bed clothes. Much of the property in storage, such as refrigerators, stoves, etc., cannot be used here, and we are now trying to work out some plan whereby needed property may be shipped at once and large and heavy items left in storage.

The attitude of the evacuees remains in general very good. They are fully cooperative in putting forth every effort to prepare for the coming winter, the health and welfare of their people being of first concern.

The rains during the week made the camp very muddy and it was necessary for the residents to adjust themselves to such conditions. Our wood cutting program and construction work were accordingly retarded.
