## **Biographical/Historical Note**

---

J. T. Carpenter was a student at Washington College whom suspended his school term during the Civil War, but returned in 1866. Carpenter was an established member of the Mu Sigma Rho Literary Society and studied Latin, Greek, and mathematics. Washington College began in 1749 as Augusta Academy twenty miles north of Lexington, Virginia. After several changes in name and location, Washington College was moved to its present site in Lexington. Robert E. Lee was president of Washington College from 1865 until his death in 1870. After he died, the college voted to change the name to Washington and Lee University.
