The President of the United States of America.

To the Marshal of the Western District of Arkansas, and to the keeper of the United States Jail at Fort Smith, Arkansas--Greeting:

WHEREAS, at the District Court of the United States of America, for the Western District of Arkansas, at the 1st Term thereof, begun and holden in Fort Smith, within and for the District aforesaid, on the 24 day of July A. D. 1894, the Grand Jurors, in and for said District empaneled, brought into the said Court a true bill of indictment against

Henry Walston
for

R.S.
in the Indian Country, against the peace and dignity of the United States. As by the said Indictment, now remaining on file and of record in said Court, will more fully appear. And,

WHEREAS, the said Henry Walston having subsequently been arrested and required to enter into a recognizance with good and lawful sureties, for his personal appearance in the United States District Court, at the United States Court room at Fort Smith, in said District, from day to day and from term to term thereafter, until discharged by order of said Court, then and there to answer what might be objected against him; and abide the orders of the Court, and not depart the said Court without leave thereof. And,

WHEREAS, the said Henry Walston having failed to enter into said recognizance, it was ordered that the said defendant be committed to jail to await trial.

WE, THEREFORE, COMMAND YOU the said Marshal, forthwith to convey the said Henry Walston to the United States Jail at Fort Smith, Arkansas, and him deliver to the keeper thereof; and you, the said Keeper, are hereby required to receive the said Henry Walston into your custody in the said jail, and him there safely keep until he shall be discharged by due course of law.

In Testimony Whereof, the Honorable ISAAC C. PARKER, Judge of the District Court of the United States for the Western District of Arkansas, has caused the seal of said Court to be hereunto affixed, this 25 day of Oct A. D. 1894, and in the 11 year of our Independence.
