Biographical/Historical Note

The National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution (NSDAR) is a lineage-based membership organization of women. It was founded on October 11, 1890, in Washington D.C. and was incorporated by a Congressional charter in 1896. Their objectives are historic preservation, education, and patriotism. In December of 1893, the first Arkansas chapter was founded in Little Rock. The organization has expanded to about 47 chapters today. The first state conference was held in 1909 and is still being held yearly.

Mrs. Francis Harrow Hanger (1856-1945) was a clubwoman, writer, and civic volunteer active in many aspects of cultural and public life of Little Rock from the 1870s until her death in 1945.

Scope and Contents

This collection consists of one certificate from the Daughters of the American Revolution stating that Mrs. Francis Harrow Hanger was elected state regent of Arkansas, dated February 17, 1898.
